
Asexual - A person who generally is not sexually attracted to any group of people.

Become An Ally!

The word "ally" is a powerful one. It means someone who has your back and is on your side, because they know it's the right thing to do. In the LGBTQ movement, an "ally" describes someone who may not be LGBTQ themselves, but who are committed to equality and who speak out against discrimination. Allies can be anyone:

- A straight classmate who sticks by a friend questioning his gender identity;
- A teacher who serves as an advisor for a gaystraight alliance (GSA);
- Parents who find ways to promote respect for diversity in their child's school;
- A counselor who is committed to making sure that LGBTQ issues are heard.
